This year the Prescott Area Iris Society's 9th Annual Spring Exhibit, "Glory of Spring" will be held on Saturday, May 10, 2008 at Mortimer Nursery. In addition entries of Aril, Spuria, Dutch, Siberian, and Louisiana iris are encouraged. Winners in all categories will be determined by public vote.

In April we're privileged to have Marge Larson, our Director-at-Large Board member who is an AIS Judge, present our General Meeting program. She has titled her demonstration "Ready, Set, Go" – which will be held April 5. A week later, on April 12, those interested in seeing how a "juried show" differs from an exhibit (winners by public vote) are invited to trek down to the valley where Sun Country Iris Society presents their "Carnival of Iris Show."

As I mentioned above, our Member Garden Tours on Saturday, May 3rd will begin at the Sculpture Garden, followed by the home gardens of Joyce & Phil Crenshaw and Audrey & Victor Velonis, and ending at Linda & Lee Rossman's Hummingbird Iris Gardens. The Board is planning to offer hot beverages and sweet rolls at the College garden and a nice lunch at Linda's home. Although not advertised to the public you may invite friends to tour with you – however, to ensure adequate food, please RSVP to Linda Rossman or me; there will be a donation basket at Linda's to offset the cost of the food.

On Mother's Day weekend, Saturday, May 10th, we present our spring gift to the community – PAIS' 9th Annual Iris Exhibit at Mortimer Nursery - entitled "The Glory of Spring". Even if you don't attend Marge's demo on preparation of irises for show I hope you'll bring some entries – maybe you'll find out the name of some of your unidentified plants. That happened to me back when I was coming down with the *iris virus* – a friend had given me some rhizomes and I brought this lovely but unidentified, lavender bloom – which was immediately identified as *Mary Frances*, (1971)! By the way please call event coordinators (Ruth DeVries & Bonnie Haughton) and volunteer to help out that day.

Speaking again about volunteering - there are spaces available for planning the Hassayampa Holiday Fall Trek, Region 15's fall meeting to be held here in Prescott October 10-11. Contact either Marge Larson or Stan Book, and tell them in which area you'd like to work. The club does receive \$600 in start-up funds to help with expenses of hotel and speakers, but we'll be dipping into the treasury to fund various aspects of this event.

Which brings me to an exciting opportunity for fund-raising that happened just a week ago – Books received a phone call from the new City Engineer that had recently moved here and purchased an older home on McCormick with a large established iris garden, which they have fenced for a dog enclosure. Scott & Joy Tkach wish to donate most of the iris to our club, but they desire removal before April 1st. The area is about 13 by 34 feet, and has an estimated 60 clumps of iris. The prior owner had died and no garden map exists. The Board has planned a Work Party for Friday, March 28 to dig up and pot portions of each clump (a neighbor states each clump is a different variety). We need lots of the plastic nursery pots – five gallon size – and *you to volunteer.* Please e-mail or call me if you can help that day or if you can donate some containers, or if you have space to store the potted irises and would water them.

Now, that was a lot of information – I want to close now with wishes for a Happy Easter and Springtime to you all..... and a warm welcome to our new members!

Barry's Golden Wisdom March-April

- Remove dead leaves.
- Pull all grasses and weeds.
- Remove soil from the surface of the rhizomes.
 Be careful not to break off tender new fans.
- Replace plant markers which are dislodged or lost. Check your iris map if you are unsure where a marker goes.
- Replace faded or missing plant markers.
- No iris map? Make one now while the foliage is still small and the individual plants are easy to see.
- Fertilize now, then water well. Use a granular, low nitrogen fertilizer such as 5-10-10 or 10-10-10. Sprinkle about 1 cup per clump. Keep the granuals off the rhizome.
- Water every 7-10 days to ensure good growth.

Grow Medians

Folks often say" If only irises had a longer bloom time!" The answer is, "Plant median irises!" The median bearded irises, a diverse group, start blooming with the daffodils in the spring and some are a full 6 weeks earlier than the tall bearded irises. The median class includes, Standard Dwarf, Intermediate, Miniature Tall and Border Bearded. The height of iris in the median class range from 8 to 27.5 inches.
