THE FINAL WORD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE OCTOBER 2014

Greetings to All,

This is my last Presidents message and I want to thank you All for a great two years guiding PAIS. Fall has arrived, the warm weather is over. Temperatures are now in the 30's at night and our iris planting season is all but over. Frost and freezing temperatures are not far off. We have had one of the heaviest monsoon seasons in history and our irises have loved it. My re-bloomer's are blooming, increases are everywhere. The iris we have potted for the Spring Sale, the 2015 Fall Trek and other spring PAIS projects are growing like never before. They loved rainwater. It is now time for us to get our gardens and irises ready for winter, which from all predictions will be a long, cold and wet one. Significant snow is expected at the higher elevations. For those of us that live in colder areas with lower temperatures mulching may be advisable this year. For those with the availability of pine needles, mulching with them over tender plants, roses and your irises, both potted and in the ground will help get them through a long cold winter. If you do not have pine needles straw will be a good substitute. Other leaf and vegetative material are not advised since they decompose quickly and may cause the rhizomes to rot. You may want to do a fall cleanup on your irises to get rid of some of the dead or dying leaves. For those of you who are in warmer areas and lower elevations October is still a time for planting any irises you have ordered which have come in from growers late in the season, although you may wish to pot them till spring and keep them in a protected area this year.

As we look toward the end of our current year let us not forget what will be coming up next year and during our down time organize for a very busy 2015. We will be holding our annual exhibit, sales and other events, preparing to teach about irises at Yavapai College, moving into our spring school education programs, working on the Sculpture Garden, Sharlot Hall, and the Citizens Cemetery. We will have a new President and Board and they will need the full support of the membership to assist them and accomplish our programs. As you are all aware we will have an all hands on deck event next year in October which will be our turn to host the 2015 AIS Region 15 Fall Trek which is quite an undertaking and will be a wonderful event we can all be proud of hosting. This event takes a year to prepare and our Fall Trek committee has already been hard at work organizing and planning. See the information on our fall Trek herein for more information. Choosing Flowers

In the fall 2014 Irises AIS edition there was an article on page 23 regarding companion plants. Susan Holland Spicker writes about planting flowers that bloom at the same time as the bearded irises to enhance the beauty of the garden. It has been my desire to do the same in my garden but because the irises bloom so early in Prescott and the night time temperatures are still pretty low it is a challenge to get both to bloom at the same time. California Poppies and Columbine always bloom at the same time as well as Golden Chain Tree. The remainder of my flowers blooms at different times of the year which keeps the yard looking colorful every month except December, January and part of February. Companion plants can be displayed right in the same beds as the irises either in front, back or even in between the iris.

Selecting the right plants for your flower garden is often a matter of preference, but with so many species and varieties available it can be mind-boggling. Consider the following when designing a garden: hardiness, color, fragrance, height, time of bloom and size of plant. Do you want to attract hummingbirds, butterflies or song birds? Or are you trying to create a work of beauty just for you?

While our irises take a rest during this fall season it is a good time to plant your fall bulbs; like daffodils, crocus and tulips. If you want more color in your gardens late February and March before the SDBs start to bloom consider planting bulbs now. Next spring consider planting annuals and perennials to bloom after the irises blooming season. Many of my flower beds have both annuals and perennials in bloom currently. Companion plants can bloom during the fall iris rebloom season until the first night time freeze (see photos). Consider Planting Chrysanthemums now so every October and November you will enjoy fall blooms even during the colder nights.

During the winter keep your iris beds clean and weed free with dead iris leaves removed. You don't want to give the little insects a place to lay their eggs at the base of iris leaves and amongst attached dead leaves. Water when the ground is dry and enjoy the break when it rains or snows as you won't need to water as much. Maintaining iris gardens during the winter is a cinch. Enjoy your time off from gardening.

BUSINESS SECTION

Summary of Proposed *Prescott Area Iris Society Bylaw Changes* to be voted upon at PAIS general meeting November 15, 2014.

Bylaws currently in existence are dated November 17, 2012

The following are two proposed Bylaw changes which were passed by a unanimous vote of PAIS board members present.

CURRENT BYLAWS: Article 5 Dues

5.1 Annual dues are payable in January and shall be past due March 1. Loss of membership will be automatic upon failure to renew by March 1.

Article 6 Governing Board

6.2 The Executive board shall appoint additional governing board members: director at large, publicity, membership, sculpture garden chairs and newsletter editor all of whom shall be voting members. Their term of office shall be one year.

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES:

Article 5 Dues

5.1 Annual dues are to be paid by January 31st of each calendar year (note: they may be paid for the following calendar year beginning in November of each year)

This change allows PAIS to annually print the newly adopted membership booklet and facilitates giving a composition of our membership to National and Regional offices in a more timely fashion.

Article 6 Governing Board

6.2 The Executive board shall appoint additional governing board members: director at large, publicity, membership, sculpture garden, *Sharlot Hall Historic Iris Garden and Education (youth and adult)* chairs and newsletter editor, all of whom shall be voting members. Their term of office shall be one year.

The addition of two new voting governing board members is the result of the evolution of the importance of PAIS ongoing involvement in these areas.
