



#### Mexican Street Corn Salad (Esquites)

#### Directions

Heat oil in a large non-stick skillet or wok over high heat until shimmering. Add corn kernels, season to taste with salt, toss once or twice, and cook without moving until charred on one side, about 2 minutes. Toss corn, stir, and 2 tablespoons vegetable oil 4 ears fresh corn, shucked, kernels removed (about 3 cups fresh corn kernels)

Kosher salt

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

2 ounces feta or cotija cheese, finely crumbled

1/2 cup finely sliced scallion greens

1/2 cup fresh cilantro leaves, finely chopped

jalapeño pepper, seeded and stemmed, finely chopped

1 to 2 medium cloves garlic, pressed or minced (about 1 to 2 teaspoons)

1 tablespoon fresh juice from 1 lime

Chili powder or hot chili flakes, to taste

repeat until charred on second side, about 2 minutes longer. Continue tossing and charring until well charred all over, about 10 minutes total. Transfer to a large bowl.

Add mayonnaise, cheese, scallions, cilantro, jalapeño, garlic, lime juice, and chili powder and toss to combine. Taste and adjust seasoning with salt and more chili powder to taste. Serve immediately.

If you have never sent in a sighting, please try to get a photo, so I can include your sighting on our data sheet. Sorry, but I do NEED a photo since often people confuse Monarchs with Queens, Painted Ladies and even 2 Tailed Yellow Swallow-tails! # **ALERT!** It's Iris Rhizome Munching Season...

Our local Quad-City area is known for five seasons..the usual four, plus monsoons (July 'til mid-September...which have been weak this year). But for iris gardeners there's another dreaded season that occurs just before the rains arrive, when tempeartures are scorching, patience is short, the land is parched, and so are wild critters, above and below ground. It's iris rhizome munching season.

The final week of August, gophers attacked two separate flower beds on my property, munching three different iris cultivars: a beautiful clump of SDB 'Going In Circles, 'TB 'Stormrider'~ a single, slow growing rhizome ~ that may not recover, and a vigorous clump of TB 'Red Velvet Dress.'

#### What Can We Gardeners Do to Protect Our Iris?

I took action, but more slowly than I should have. Forked up each clump only after at least one rhizome was muched. Inspected, divided, and trimmed the fans before replanting them in protective homemade root cages of my own design.

After several years of assembling root cages, I've determined the best proportions for iris: 8 inches deep and 14 to 18 inches in diameter, so vigorous rhizomes can grow into nice clumps in 3 years. I use hardware

cloth made of galvanized metal in a 1/4 inch mesh grid for the walls and chicken wire for the base.

It takes time to put the root cages together. Often wish I had a magic wand. But the effort saves my iris from predation. And is a non-lethal option for those of us who don't want to kill wildlife, simply trying to survive.

Other deterrants are:

\* Ruin the gopher holes or pack a prickly pinecone in the opening. \* Dump vanilla flavored

coffee beans in their runs (vanilla's toxic to gophers). They'll avoid it.

The easiest solution is to make raised beds. Line the base of the bed with hardware cloth or chickenwire and have fun planting!


